Blessed Stanley Rother was a Catholic priest from Okarche, Oklahoma, who went to the Mission church in Santiago Atitlan,

9:30 am – Museum

10:30 am – Guided Tour of Shrine Church and Chapel

#### Success By Harry Frantz

On April 8<sup>th</sup>, I took the Corvette on a road trip to southeast Oklahoma to view the 2024 "Total Solar Eclipse Across America." I had been lucky enough to view one other total eclipse in 2017 in my home town of Atchison, Ks., but it turned cloudy and I got very little video. I was hoping for better weather this time but it didn't look good on the weather reports.

I packed several maps, some fried chicken, some books, a lawn chair and the video camera into the Corvette and headed out around 5:00 am hopefully to avoid, or at least delay, the expected high traffic predicted by the news media. Lo and behold, the traffic didn't materialize at all. I took the southeast diagonal route on two-lane highways thinking it would be less traveled than the interstate. It was. As a matter of fact, there was a lot more traffic going north than south. Getting away from the onslaught of tourists maybe?

After several hours of driving, I ended up in a little bump in the road called Haworth, just a few miles southeast of Idabel and smack dab in the path of totality. As I traversed through the path of totality, I spied several places that allowed people to park on their property to watch the eclipse for \$50.00. One was a farmer's field and one was a church parking lot in Haworth. I didn't take advantage of either one. Instead, I opted for a parking lot of another church right on the highway.

There was no one else there at first but a few more watchers moseyed in as the day wore on. The first thing I did was set up the lawn chair and dig out a book to read. It was only 9:00 or 10:00 in the morning at this time. Later on, I put the video camera on its tripod and set it up on the car pointing straight up. It was now time to dig into the fried chicken that Susan had cooked the day before. Boy was it good!

It was now time for the eclipse and the sun gods were looking down on us. There were a few clouds in the sky but not where the sun was. I donned my eclipse glasses and checked out the sun. It was starting. I got the sun in the view finder of the video and started to record. I decided to just record a few minutes at a time at different positions of occultation. After all, looking at several hours of video as the moon slowly crossed in front of the sun would be rather boring.

Time finally came for totality. I turned on the video as there was just the smallest of crescents left before totality. I was going to record the whole 4 ½ minutes of totality and end as the small crescent reappeared. I haven't been successful at hooking up the camera to the TV yet to watch but I have a terrible feeling that it was out of focus due to the darkness.

I took the camera down once to record a panorama of the area to show how dark it was. Stars (or planets) came out, it got cold and the birds stopped flying. I was going to take a picture with my phone but I was too busy and didn't get it done. It was my very first time to view the sun during totality and it was awesome. I could even see some solar ejections in the corona that appeared as red spots.

With the most important part of the eclipse over, I didn't see any reason to stick around for the sun to completely reappear. I packed up the lawn chair and video equipment and jumped in the Corvette for

the drive home. I set the GPS for "home" which turned out to be a big mistake. Apparently, everyone else had the same idea as to when to leave and the GPS took me back along the interstate instead of the way I had come. I had just gotten back to Idabel when I hit the first of three highway parking lots. This one was just an influx of people wanting out and the other two were due to work zones on the interstate.

Even when I wasn't crawling along, it was still very crowded on the highway. I finally got home around 6:00 or 7:00 pm. Even with the bad traffic, I was very happy to have, what turned out to be, a once in a lifetime event and I'd do it all over again in a heartbeat.

Subject: Status of the 2024 International Jaguar Festival

It is with deep regret that the 2024 International Jaguar Festival originally planned for Flagstaff, Arizona, has been cancelled.

As the incoming President of JCNA, I strongly supported this event that was originally scheduled this year for September for several reasons:

- Hosting an IJF and the three primary sanctioned events would provide overdue opportunities for an
  underserved geographic market area for many JCNA clubs, understanding that many JCNA members
  must travel far and wide to secure three sanctioned scores in order to be eligible for North American points.
  An event in Flagstaff would provide a 3<sup>rd</sup>, and possibly a 4<sup>th</sup> sanctioned event and therefore greatly reduce
  the time, expense, and resources to obtain the minimum number of events.
  - JCNA has advertised this signature event to be held in Flagstaff, AZ since last fall.
- Significant planning, arrangements and the resources of others have been made by JCNA, and affiliate clubs.

Unfortunately, despite extraordinary efforts, we have been unable to coordinate appropriate hotel lodging and venue space that would be suitable for both the Concours and Slalom events with all the amenities for a safe, affordable, and enjoyable event. The cancellation decision was made by both the Executive Committee and the Board of JCNA after much consideration and discussion.

Unforeseen complications with our planning process contributed to the cancellation of this event. Measurable actions have been taken to prevent such occurrences in the future.

Please accept my sincere apologies for any disruption to plans this may have caused.

Looking forward to 2025, JCNA is fortunate to have many well managed and robust clubs located in optimum market areas that would be ideal for an IJF. Please contact your Regional Director or myself personally if your club is interested in hosting our next IJF.
