Well, it is election season. While this is being written before the November 5 Presidential election and there is little doubt most everyone is tired of being barraged with political advertisements and solicitations and most likely you will receive this edition of Jaguar Jargon after the national election is concluded, I am nevertheless asking you to vote once again.

Specifically, it is time to elect the Officers and Board of Directors for the Jaguar Club of Pittsburgh. This is accomplished annually and for the past few years the club has made it easy to vote, since it is done entirely electronically over a 15-day period in November. You will receive an email advising you of the slate of candidates and even though there are no contested positions up for election, it is respectfully asked if you would nevertheless vote. While JCOP treats each "membership" to include both members of a household (which is why spouse/partner data is needed when you become a member or renew as a member), for purposes of voting for the Officers and Directors, there is only one vote per membership.

I have served two one-year terms as President of the Jaguar Club of Pittsburgh and it is time for a new President. Please review the slate of candidates and vote to show your support for their devotion of time, talent, effort, and money to have JCOP operate as a club that can be considered as a model for other clubs in various regards. I will likely become the Treasurer and Membership Chair for next year so I will not "be going anywhere soon".

Speaking of financial things, I am pleased to announce that JCOP has made arrangements through PNC Bank and Clover to permit us to set up a "button" on our website so payments can be made via credit card for membership dues and for events. It is not required anyone pay on line by credit card but increasingly we have heard this ability is sought in lieu of requiring any member to write checks and send them through the US Postal Service. So we have responded and are going to have to pay fees to do this but we hope it is worthwhile to many of you and future members. We cannot afford the plans that allow completion and submission of membership or other forms on line from our website so if one pays on line for annual membership dues, the person still needs

to convey the information about themselves and their membership information to the Treasurer via email. There will be multiple ways to do this as set forth on the website. And anyone can still, if they desire, mail a check to the Treasurer with the completed form as has now been the protocol for years.

In last month's Jargon, a "hot off of the press" letter was included from Jaguar Clubs of North America regarding their increasing their dues to \$55 per year for 2025. With the Jaguar Club of Pittsburgh annual dues remaining the same at \$35, this makes annual dues being \$90. We then pay the \$55 to JCNA unless you are already a member of an affiliate club who paid your \$55 JCNA dues for 2025 and just want to be an affiliate member of JCOP, in which case you only pay us \$35.

We enjoyed two spectacular Fall Leaf Tours in October. John Putzier's Fall Leaf Brunch Tour to Tara was just superb and Pete Galinowski's Fall Leaf Tour was a smashing event, taking roads where we stopped and enjoyed most interesting shops and places to see of interest along with a great lunch as Das Dutch Haus. 2024 Fall Leaf Brunch Tour to Tara, a *Tour de Force*

It was a gorgeous Sunday Fall morning when a group of 30 of us, in many Jaguars, convened at the starting point in Harmony, PA for the 2024 edition of the Fall Leaf Brunch Tour to Tara. Tara is advertised as Tara – A Country Inn and is located up north from Pittsburgh in beautiful Mercer County. Harmony, PA is north of Zelienople, PA in Butler County so we started well north of the city anyway and enjoyed a drive to Tara of about one and a half hours.

The Fall foliage was in its prime splendor and those of us with sun roofs certainly opened the inside covers wide so anyone, including some in rears seats, could

see the trees not only out the windows but also by looking upwards.

The trip was wonderful but so was the food. The



Sunday Brunch Buffet truly had something for everyone and "something" is an understatement since it was "a lot" of things. And on top of a sumptuous choice of food from the multiple buffet stations, anyone could order (included in the fixed price) a choice of omelets (with choices of up to seven different fillings) and Waffles and Crepes (with choices of six different fillings/toppings). No one went away hungry or disappointed; the quality of the servings was first class.

But Tara is really more than a mere "Country Inn" since it really is a museum in many different regards. Twenty six of us took a guided tour of the mansion after brunch and the history we learned was fascinating. The home was built in 1854 by Charles Koonce. Originally a red brick Federal-style farmhouse, his descendants added Ionic columns and porches and painted it white to give it the appearance of a Southern Georgian plantation look in the antebellum Greek Revival style.

It was purportedly used as a stop on the Underground Railroad and we were shown where slaves were hid up in the rafters. After years of use by the family, it fell into lack of use and disrepair until Jim Winner purchased it and commenced a renovation to turn it into a country inn that opened in 1986 with 27 guestrooms, casual and gourmet restaurants, and a collection of artifacts and memorabilia both varied and most interesting in nature.



Mr. Winner's wife, Donna, was always fascinated by the movie "Gone with the Wind" and with the appearance of the premises looking much like Tara in the movie, that is how Tara – A Country Inn got named by Mr. & Mrs. Winner (Mr. Winner passed away some years ago but Mrs. Winner now resides there).

JCOP filled up (with some overflow to an adjacent room for our brunch) Stonewall's Tavern, a part of the building in the lowest reaches of the basement where the servants lived in the 1800s. Adjacent to Stonewall's Tavern is a hallway going to the Old South Dining Room (where the buffet was laid out and where other seating was available). In this hallway was a collection of Remington bronze sculptures (depicting "Wild West" figures) that is one of the largest collections extant. There is a display case of Civil War era pistols in the Old South Dining Room as well. In Tara is also a floor to ceiling glass case with antique guns. Mr. Winner was purportedly the owner of the second-largest gun collection in the United States.

There is one entire room devoted to memorabilia from Gone with the Wind movie with clothes worn by Vivian Leigh and Clark Gable and much, much more. It is a true museum.



furniture, to Tiffany-style lamps, to a "coffin piano" to on and on. Indeed, some members noted two armchairs covered in cloth that mirrored that of a Jaguar pelt and insisted your President get photographed in a "Jaguar Chair". So he did. *(see photo at left)*

Each of the 27 rooms is different and beautiful. There is both an indoor and outdoor swimming pool. Statues surround the outdoor pool and other places outside such that on our next return trip, we will ask to be given information about those intriguing statues. What a great location for a get-away special occasion.

The trip for everyone back home was on their own schedule and route but it was such a beautiful day and with full tummies all around, everyone enjoyed their trips back home as well with most colorful Fall foliage and scenic rolling Pennsylvania countryside all around wherever one drove.

Pete Galinowski is a special person, as long known by the members of the Jaguar Club of Pittsburgh. As is his

wife, Janet. Pete is a longstanding JCOP member, a longtime member of the Board of Directors, and of course he is a Past President, and an always-volunteer behind the scenes (along with his son, Richard) to help make the JCOP Concours d'Elegance run seamlessly. His renown, however, may be because he is best known for organizing and leading the official JCOP Fall Leaf Tour for so many years.

The tour has always been special in terms of the route, the many stops at stores and shops (with a seeming preponderance of nice places that sell candy and ice cream) and having stops for educational and scenic overlooks; of course, lunch (and often dinner as well) at special places are always part of the tours that have had a theme of visiting western Pennsylvania and eastern Ohio locales. For so many years Pete has done this (always right around Halloween where Janet hands out a mini-bag of candy to each car) such that it really is colloquially known as the "Galinowski Fall Leaf Tour" and not as much the JCOP Fall Leaf Tour.

So when COVID was here and interfered with the Galinowski tour, Pete still found a way to have a driving tour.





We also proceeded rain or shine so weather never stopped Pete, who spends many hours researching places and routes and then test-driving them to ensure there are no goblins that would be unexpectedly encountered by merely looking at maps and on line. So it was noteworthy that we had to take a break for the last couple years when Pete had a significant health issue he needed to defeat (and he did, after a long recovery from surgery). It was in this hiatus that John Putzier started the Fall Leaf Brunch Tour for JCOP. But this year Pete was ready to go again out on the road so JCOP enjoyed having both events on back-to-back weekends of gorgeous weather and Fall foliage. What a fabulous treat!

The 2024 Fall Leaf Tour started early on Saturday morning at the rendezvous site on Rt. 65 (Ohio River

Boulevard) in Bellevue, PA utilizing a McDonald's parking lot so folks could grab breakfast items if desired and lower the fluid levels not in their Jaguars) before heading out on the road.

Following our driver's meeting and receipt of excellent written directions we drove north on Rt. 65 and stopped at the Emsworth Dam and Locks, where we viewed a tugboat going through the locks. We were parked between two sets of railroad tracks and, of course, trains came past on both sides of us and our cars as we were standing there. The Emsworth Locks/Dam was noted by an historical marker to be near the beginning of the Lewis & Clark Expedition Route, which started in Pittsburgh after their boats were built here. After seeing these freight trains close up, after a stop at Anderson Candies we continued to drove north on Rt. 65 past the origin of the trains: the Conway [Train] Yard (aka Conway Terminal) that from 1956 until 1980 was the largest freight yard in the world and still is one of the largest in the United States. Pete, of course, had provided every car with a written history about the Conway Yard.

Then we took a spirited drive to Columbiana, Ohio (passing



Jaguar Mk2 restoration – Part 11

Let's cut right to the chase with this installment. My 1966 Jaguar Mk2 runs!

Several small but important things have happened since the last edition of this story. Sourcing the ignition wires was something that I had put off as I did not know how I wanted to proceed. To begin with, selecting what I need turned out to be far more complicated than I had thought. Do I buy the wires and ends in bulk and assemble them myself? Do I want to use the factory (looking) conduit that organizes the wires? Do I need resistance plugs? Resistance wires? What does the coil want to see? I'm running an aftermarket electronic distributor from Pertronix. Pertronix made a name for themselves by developing a small electronic module that fits under the distributor cap to replace the older and troublesome mechanical points and condenser. It is basically an electronic switch, triggered by a rotating magnet that replaces a mechanical switch/ cam arrangement. Its purpose is to energize the coil, creating the high voltage necessary for the spark plugs to spark. In reality, it is a little more complicated than that but I'll leave the electromagnetic theory research up to you. In addition to making the points-eliminating modules for a multitude of different cars, Pertronix also supplies complete distributors for certain engines, with the Jaguar 3.8 liter XK engine being one of them. Since my original distributor was in bad shape, I bought the complete Pertronix distributor.

I static timed the engine to 7 degrees BTDC per the manual using a test light. The final adjustment will be determined with a timing light while the engine is running. Static timing allows you to get things close enough to allow the engine to run. The SU carburetors, two SU HD6 units on the Mk2, were setup for an initial start-up per the manual. As with the timing, adjustments will be made once the engine is running.

I had previously tested the fuel supply by putting a few gallons of gas in the tank and connecting power to the fuel pump. Everything was remarkably dry right up the carburetors, which were leaking badly from the underside. The carburetors were removed from the engine

and I found that the small starting carburetor was the source of the leak.

Manuals were consulted, seals were swapped, and the bolts were cranked down as tight as I could get them. Once replaced, the leaking was at least under control. It is still a little damp after sitting for a while but at least gasoline is not pouring onto the floor.

With all this prep work completed, I connected the battery, switched on the ignition, and pushed the button on the starter solenoid under the hood. To be honest, it scared me when the engine burst to life with a couple of seconds of cranking. My expectation was a lot of cranking, adjustments, trouble shooting and, only then, having it catch on a couple of cylinders and run very poorly. In reality, the engine sounds great and I really could not be happier. Not wanting to celebrate this victory with carbon monoxide poisoning, I let it run 20 seconds or so and shut it down.

Once I have some time and can push the car to the garage door, I will fire it up, balance and set the mixture as well as dial in the timing. The coolant is topped up and is not leaking anywhere that I can see but it will be interesting to see if it remains leak free once the engine comes up to operating temperature. I am using Evan's waterless coolant in the engine as it will not corrode the metal inside the engine like water-ethylene glycol coolant (if not regularly maintained). Evan's also has a higher boiling point and will not create as much pressure as it gets near the operating temperature of the engine. Elsewhere on the car, I solved the wiper motor current draw by disconnecting the power wire. While this is not truly a solution, it does allow me to kick the can down the road.

For some reason, I never removed the sound deadening material from the inside of the roof before or during the car's stay at the body shop. To avoid any chance of damage, that should have been done before the body work was finished.

I now know the reason.... It was a miserable job. The thick, fuzzy stuff is stuck to the roof with tar (!!), which involved a lot of scraping and tar-melting with mineral spirits. It's now done and its probably best we don't speak of that again. It will be replaced with a modern Dynamatlike material to provide thermal and sound insulation. Finally, while I would love to toot the horn in celebration, I cannot. I'm now on my fourth "good used!!" Lucas lownote horn that, in fact, does not work. The original highnote horn works just fine in either location but no love from the low-notes. If anyone needs a box of low-note Lucas horns that look nice but don't work, please let me know.

"Next stage in Jaguar's transformation" is confirmed for debut

during Miami Art Week

Jaguar is set to enter its next era with the unveiling of a new concept car previewing its long-awaited electric GT on 2 December.

Autocar previously reported that the radical concept is due next month, and the brand has now said that the "next stage in Jaguar's transformation" will





The bombshell, part of parent company JLR's second-quarter financial presentation, confirms that we are just weeks away from getting our first taste of Jaguar's ground-up reinvention.

Jaguar managing director Rawdon Glover recently told Autocar that the decision to reveal the concept in the US was down to that market's importance, but added the brand is not disregarding its origins.

"Don't read that as 'Britishness isn't important'," said Glover. "It's a really important part of the brand. But we're also a global brand. And look at the size and the scale of the US market. For us it's really important."

JLR said in August that it has begun road testing camouflaged prototypes of the next-generation Jaguars. The GT is due to go on sale late next year, with the first deliveries taking place in summer 2026.

Jaguar recently ended sales of new cars in the UK, having ceased production of the F-Pace SUV for its home market. It remains available elsewhere, however.

A statement sent to Autocar by JLR read: "From November 2024, new Jaguar sales will come to an end ahead of our new brand reveal later this year and product launch in 2026.

"We have now ceased allocation of our current generation of Jaguar vehicles. We do have a selection of models available to acquire on an Approved Pre-Owned basis through our UK retail network."

Production of the F-Pace for global markets will cease in the first quarter of 2026, said JLR CEO Adrian Mardell.
