Then back to Issaquah and Fortunato Chocolates. Made locally from rare


cacao from the northern Peruvian Jungle, featuring key lime cookie



Ben Brown's XK120 grille restoration Many *JagMag* readers know the story of Ben Brown and the XK120 Drophead Coupe his grandfather put in his care. He has been working on the car while driving it to events around the area, including Exotics @ Redmond Town Center.

Here is what he shared with another XK120 owner, Ehab Sahawneh, "I hope you are doing well, wanted to share an update on the grille. I used a whole lot of 0000 steel wool to shine up every surface and got back a lot of shine. I just got the loose tooth glued back in last night using the fancy 3M adhesive, the first time the grille has been in one piece for a long time." (Photo left, the grille mostly unrestored; left teeth have been steel wooled. Photo right, the shine is back.)

Ben told Ehab, "Thank you for the advice! It's just the right amount of restored for me."

Ben added that "the tooth has been out of the grille since the 90s and I don't think the chrome was ever cleaned up. The grille still has light damage but that's exactly what I wanted, as the hood itself has matching damage. If I straightened all out I would lose some history and also not fit the hood opening anymore, I'll save that for later. Looking forward to Spring and getting this reinstalled."

Cynthia First and Alan Donald scouted the territory, starting at the adventure base camp, the Arlington Safeway, where we could fuel up at the gas pumps and

Learning from a lifetime with raptors After Cynthia briefed the navigator/driver teams, Steve Layman, a noted raptor expert, told us about eagles and other raptors and their environment. The falconer: Getting up close and personal with raptors | Whidbey News-Times He and his guest drove along with us, answering questions at the nonprofit Skagit River Bald Eagle Interpretive Center in Rockport and at II Granaio Restaurant, our destination restaurant in Mount Vernon. Not being able to get close enough to hear Steve, I asked some members what he said. Thanks to Monte Powell, Jon Rogers, Sue Kingston, and Ray Papineau for their recollections, such as:

The osprey catches the salmon at the surface of the water then the eagle attacks the osprey as it gains altitude and forces it to drop the salmon and the eagle gets food with little expenditure of energy.

The avian influenza has been infecting the raptor population in Washington. There is a vaccine but it's not available in the US. There is human medication that can be given at high doses in two-hour intervals that can counter the disease.


The number of Eagles is rising and there are more today than ever before.

And according to Ray Papineau: "1.) The eagles follow the migrating ducks from Alaska as the predators in Africa, follow the migrating wildebeest. 2.) In Alaska, eagles steal ducks caught by foxes. 3.) The Eagles have sold over 200 million copies worldwide wide, *Hotel California* being their best-selling album in the US."

Learning from the land We departed Arlington along SR 530 NE, the Arlington-Darrington Rd, through Oso and past the Oso Slide Memorial It is a reminder of the March 22, 2014, 10:37 a.m. landslide that flowed over the North Fork of the Stillaguamish River and over the Steelhead Haven community. It covered one square mile, took 43 lives and obliterated 49 homes and other structures. Recovery efforts involved more than 600 personnel, including 160+ volunteers. Within a day of the slide, eleven survivors were rescued. Then community members and emergency responders returned to the site every day for another four months until they recovered every victim.

Stop next time you drive by the memorial to appreciate that, "The design for the 2-acre memorial is based on the idea that visitors to an educationally and emotionally intense place will move through six stages: arrival, decompression, reception, orientation, interpretation, and transformation." https://www.snohomishcountywa.gov/Facilities/Facility/Details/SR-530-Slide-Memorial-193.

Learning from docents and displays We travelled east up the valley of the North Fork of the Stillaguamish ("Stilly") to Derrington where 530 turns left toward Rockport. The sun broke through the clouds (above) for most of the rest of the day. We enjoyed the subtle winter colors as we cruised downstream along the Sauk River to its confluence with the Skagit River at Rockport and our intermediate destination, the Skagit River Bald Eagle Interpretive Center (right). https://skagiteagle.org/.






The Skagit River Bald Eagle Interpretive Center is the best place to orient yourself to habits of the biggest of our raptors (juvenile eagle above) as well as other birds of prey along the Skagit. It also has information about best viewing areas. The

Interpretive Center is located in the Howard Miller Steelhead Park. Volunteer docents are there to answer questions (above right). When we visited, the Skagit Eagle Watchers were stationed in Steelhead Park and other places along the Skagit River to help visitors to use their binoculars and spotting scopes (right) to see the eagles and to learn more https://skagiteaglewatchers.wordpress.com/about/









By asking the available local experts and our speaker Steve Layman, by exploring displays and by reading the literature, we learned that the Skagit is one of the largest wintering bald eagle populations in the Lower 48, due to the Skagit's wild salmon runs. Bald eagle viewing increases each year.


One of the recommended eagle viewpoints was the SR 530 bridge spanning the Skagit at the park. Most of our bird-spotters headed out to look. Few eagles were cooperating, but our group seemed happy to stand above the Skagit basking in the brilliant winter sun and the brilliant company (above and cover).







Rockport was once an intermodal **hub** To most of us traveling the North Cascade Highway on SR 20 that runs all the way from Okanogan to the Port Townsend ferry at Keystone on Whidbey Island, Rockport (above) is just a Shell gas station next to the highway. But it was the terminus of the Great Northern rail line from Burlington, hauling passengers and lumber, cattle and mining equipment. It linked to other transportation hauling goods required to build Seattle City Light's Diablo and Ross dams. The utility ran rail excursions to its dams and lakes through Rockport. And in the early 1900s, the Skagit had ten to twelve large ferry boats (sign, left) and sternwheelers (1887 house, middle.) https:// washingtonstate.fandom.com/wiki/ Rockport.



On to the Eagle Tree After Cynthia prodded us back into our cars and Randy Pickett got his long dormant XJS to start again at the most remote portion this 175-plus mile shakedown drive, we headed west on SR 20 toward Bow and Edison on the Samish and Skagit Flats. We stopped to look at the eagles and huge nest at the apparently well-known Eagle Tree between Bayview Edison Rd and the Samish River. (The Eagle Tree holds the nest, which can be four feet high.)

At the II Granaio restaurant, Steve Layman explained what we were seeing, such as the large female who lords over the next and the different-aged males, with the juveniles appearing larger than reality because their feathers are longer and they essentially "puffed up," much like the quilted parkas so many of us were wearing.

old self managed to rip the door off his Porsche 924 on a Florida turnpike and how the weld on the amateur repair failed at the worst time involving his boss as a passenger.





Another founding member back in 1959, is Adrian Brennan (bottom). Born in England, he joked that they didn't use microphones like he was handed, instead using a "trumpet" [megaphone]. His wife Hilda has an immaculate 60,000-mile XK8 convertible, and Adrian drives a 2007 XK coupe that "runs perfectly and is an exceptional car, except the front and rear tires are different sizes." The Seattle Jaguar Club is growing and more active than ever. Craig Duckering pointed out that the number of new memberships increased from about 18 in 2021 and 2022 to 42 in 2024. Membership now hovers around 200. He talked about the increasing number and variety of activities, about 43 a year!

Brian Case, who is our VP Activities, Northwest Region Director and Executive Committee Member for JCNA, announced that our club is the 2nd largest in JCNA, 8 members short of beating San Francisco.







Brian talked about Jaguar being forced into all-electric vehicles with prototypes now being tested. By summer we will see photos of the new car. Production will start late 2025 with introduction in 2026.

He said that it costs \$1 billion to develop a totally new car, including the powertrain? But Jaguar is in the best financial shape in decades. Owner Tata has been very supportive with enough money to develop an SUV and a two-door sportscar. They have dedicated \$3.5B to this effort.

Answering an audience question, Brian said that Jaguar is eliminating 30 to 60 percent of its US dealerships, leaving only Bellevue as a Washington State dealer. Lynwood, Tacoma and Spokane dealerships will not be selling Jaguars. The new Bellevue store has been supportive of our club and has hired senior mechanics from Spokane who can work on our older cars. And JLR is expanding the range of replacement Jaguar parts.

Craig had Griot's gift certificates for and recognized several club volunteer leaders After 12 years, John Holmes leaves as treasurer, the position filled by John Blackburn.

After nine years as the membership chair, Bob Book passes the responsibility to Craig Duckering and remains as trustee.

Sharon & Brian Case were recognized for their many critical Seattle Jaguar Club, JCNA and Western Washington All British Field Meet roles.

Kurt Jacobson has been *JagMag* editor since 2018 and expects to pass the mouse and keyboard to a new editor this year.

Secretary since 2016, Chris Eseman says his 1966 E-Type still puts a smile on his face.

VP Technical Randy Pickett & Suzanne Nelson were recognized for the first anniversary of their marriage at last year's Annual General Meeting and Randy's VP Technical volunteer role.

Paul Petach continues to contribute to the club in his role as past president.

President Craig also introduced new Trustee Bob Willits, who like Bob Book is also Bob married to a Tanya. (Continued)

Thanks very much for a fun and interesting meeting yesterday!—Kristin"






