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
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EDITOR'S DESK

Giggles in Cars



Well, there will always be these stories that come along where you don't know whether to laugh or cry. Big shocker on this one. Jaguar ceased production of all petrol automobiles in June of 2024 except for the F-Pace. Sales in 2025 dropped by 97.5%. No surprise there. Many Jaguar Land Rover dealerships had their dealerships revoked by JLR sparking numerous lawsuits across the UK. Numbers suggest it will drop from 83 to less than 20 within 18 months to two years. A few will be Land Rover only. All this while many say the EV market is not stable.

In November of 2024 a controversial teaser campaign was released that very few understood. Even the US president called out Jaguar while praising the 'Great Jeans' campaign featuring Sydney Sweeney. Late in 2024 Jaguar Land Rover CEO Adrian Mardell resigns. Then in May of 2025 it was announced that the agency, Accenture Song, was being fired in the wake of the avalanche of criticism leveled at the campaign. It is no wonder that they may rethink their plans.



The final two races were run before a hometown crowd in London, England. Fellow TCS driver Mitch Evans was second behind Cassidy in the final London race but was relegated to fifth due to a penalty. Evans, who won two races of his own, finished the season in the 13 spot for individual drivers. However, that was good enough for Jaguar TCS Racing to also post a yearend second in the team standings. Add to that, Jaguar TCS Racing was awarded second place in the manufacturers' category for the hat trick of seconds.

Cassidy and Evans may have felt a little something extra from the London crowd but neither driver is from the UK. As a matter of fact, both drivers are 'kiwis' from New Zealand. If the internet is to be believed, Nick Cassidy will be departing Jaguar TCS Racing at the end of the 2025-2026 season. Saw it as a headline so wonder if it is to another Formula E team or maybe he's moving up to Formula 1. Don't know.


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Jags in Pop Culture - Mick Jagger



It doesn't seem to matter what area or town in Ontario you venture into, you'll find out who their favourite sons are. Owen Sound is no exception.


The most prominent and well known to visitors would be artist Tom Thomson.

Another, better known to us as 'Billy' Bishop for whom the Toronto Island Airport is named. On the right is looking up the sound behind the hotel.




Great start to Friday in Elsie's Fifties retro diner.










...as Jim said...just a 'Coles Notes' version of this spectacular July drive

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In May, my daughter Gail and I travelled to visit my sister in Sos, in the southwest of France. We stayed at the Château de Cauderoue, just outside of Nérac in the Lot-et-Garonne. A remarkable place, part 9th-century, part 12th, filled with antiquities, sweeping rooms, and tasteful décor throughout. Should you find yourself in the area, I highly recommend it. The contact there is Carol Hirschland (carol.hirschland@hotmail.fr), and she'll take good care of you.

But I digress.

One morning, taking our host's advice, we set off to find the small village of Fources, which I had visited years ago and remembered fondly. We wound our way along narrow country roads, taking in the rolling scenery, when a large white sign caught my eye. Standing alone in a field, in bold black letters: **JAGUAR**. Quite out of place, but all the more delightful for it.

And then, as if summoned by the sign itself, a red E-Type convertible appeared on the road ahead, gliding toward us through the French countryside. It was like seeing an old friend in an unexpected place.

Eventually, slightly lost but undeterred, we found our way to the fortified village of Fources. We parked outside the old stone walls and wandered in, only to discover, to our utter amazement, some 25 Jaguars gathered in the central square, with their owners deep in discussion, polishing chrome, and admiring each other's machines.



I struck up a conversation with a few of them. One had just imported a pristine burgundy Jaguar Vanden Plas from Germany, complete with original tools and manuals. Another had

the twin to my own XK convertible, which he stores in winter while driving the XK Coupe year-round. Of course, no snow ever touches these roads.



I introduced myself as a Concours judge back in Ontario, and on quick inspection, I can assure you, many of these cars would walk away with top honours at our own events. It was a spontaneous, heartwarming encounter, completely unplanned, yet perfectly timed.


Fources itself is a marvel. One of *Les Plus Beaux Villages de France*, it's known for its circular square, fortified stone homes, and its enduring charm. The village feels untouched by time. The region, too, is rich in flavour: Armagnac, foie gras, Floc (a local fortified wine reminiscent of port). For an unforgettable meal, I must recommend *Monsieur Guss* at 7 Avenue Mondenand in Nérac, a restaurant as delightful in presentation as in taste. We stumbled upon it, only to later discover it is listed in the 2025 Michelin guide. The cuisine was superb - local, seasonal, artistic. An experience I will savour for years to come. This trip, shared with my daughter, was one to remember and certainly one to repeat. I may not be lucky enough to catch another Jaguar gathering in the wild, but I'll be stopping in Bordeaux next time to visit some new Jaguar friends. Because if there's anything better than the open road, it's the people you meet along the way.
